The PMDoS programme had its most successful year to date, with over 60 volunteer consultants collaborating with 16 charities and not-for-profits. This immense achievement is a credit to the dedication and meticulous planning of our Volunteering Director, Daniel Simpson, and his team.

Our mentoring programme, a cornerstone of the chapter, kicked off with a record-breaking mentor speed-dating session, bringing together 62 participants, and went on to connect 80 mentors and mentees throughout the year. Another highlight was the Agile Symposium 2024, co-hosted in collaboration with RMIT University and another six PMI chapters. With eight hosts—one university and seven PMI chapters—and 19 partners spanning all continents, this symposium exemplified the power of partnership and collaboration on a global scale.

These signature programmes set a high benchmark for excellence, embodying the innovative spirit of our chapter.

This newsletter also highlights some of our newest initiatives: the Built Environment SIG, Rising Leaders, Women in Project Management, and the innovative Lunch and Learn series. The October session, in collaboration with the Optus Centre, focused on proactively managing psychosocial risks in project management. Our monthly Chapter event series concluded with an interactive workshop by Creative Master Facilitator Jacinta Cubis, focusing on the four Ws of workshop design. We thank our collaborators for helping to co-create a diverse range of event offerings throughout 2024.

The highly anticipated annual Chapter event, held on 21 November at the Queen Victoria Women's Centre, provided an opportunity to celebrate an incredible year of achievements, milestones, and connections. It was an inspiring evening highlighting the strength and dedication of our project management community. A


